## From the Director of Choral Activities

Dear RCSers,

Since writing to you about a year ago, the RCS has grown in terrific ensemble singing, and pride and passion for what they have accomplished. They sound warm, clear, and richly communicative. Over the course of last year and this we will have sung some 40 a cappella works from Hildegard through O'Regan (12th to the 21st centuries), performed some 10 concerts on two spring tours (the American Southeast, and Northeast), hosted our 4th Festival of Women's Choruses (12 treble choruses: youth, high school, college, adult; 4 publishers 6 composers), joined with the Collegium and Glee Club to perform Beethoven's Missa Solemnis, and this spring the Holden three will premiere Robert Kyr's Song of Awakening, commissioned and composed in honor of my 32 years as Director of Choral Activities at Harvard.

Song of Awakening is a deeply thoughtful, expressive, and beautiful a cappella work of about 15 minutes in length for four choirs: RCS, HGC, HRCM, and all-Holden. Robert and I talked at length over a six-month period of time about his work. Above all, I asked him to write a piece with considerable polyphony and counterpoint, using the four choirs and their diverse vocal ranges as a mosaic of colors and contrasts, resembling in spirit the great polychoral masterworks of the late Renaissance/early Baroque. Wow, did we pick the right composer to do that!

Already we have spent considerable time on *Song of Awakening*. The text is in Latin, primarily biblical, and ranges in mood from sorrow to joy. Robert

asked me to name my "favorite choral works", and he has incorporated brief melodic, harmonic, textural details sprinkled throughout his work. Most importantly he knows exactly what the Holden Choirs can do, because he heard RCS, HGC, HRCM in concert many times at Harvard while he was a student here in the mid-1980s completing his PhD in Composition. [Bev Taylor commissioned several works from Robert in the '80s for RCS]. He is currently Chair of the Composition Department at the University of Oregon.

Beethoven's Missa performance last spring was I believe the finest majorwork performance the Holden Choirs have given in my 32 years at Harvard. It is not possible for me to grasp 32 years, however it is abundantly clear to me that my life with the students of Harvard and Radcliffe has been indescribably enriched. In particular the past 15 years as principal conductor for the Choral Society, the pleasure I have felt in working with them runs very deeply. The EC leadership has been visionary and inspiring. RCS's rehearsal tenacity and hard work at perfecting has been extremely rewarding, and their personal warmth, laughter, empathy, and joy have offered me immensely satisfying personal and musical rewards.

Above all that I have been able to accomplish at Harvard, I leave knowing that the three Holden Choirs hold up mirrors of excellence in choral performance for each to emulate, through which they feel a deep bond of parallel accomplishment, and by which they are bathed in considerable joy and satisfaction. Despite 16 close harmony groups, more than 55



musical-dramatic productions each year, we maintain our traditional "60 singers", and they feel enormous pride in their choral community of kindred spirits.

The sense of Holden well-being is a tangible catalyst for equal leadership, choral musicianship, and inspired concert projects. We have now 6 choirs that constitute the whole of the Choral Program: RCS, HGC, HRCM, the Harvard-Radcliffe Chorus, Choir-in-Progress, the Holden Chamber Ensembles, as well as four student-directed ensembles with independent concert schedules that provide a wellspring of experience for student conductors, many of whom choose to go into the choral field.

Thedirection of the Choral Program would not be possible were it not for Kevin Leong, Associate Conductor of the Harvard Radcliffe Choruses, who shares with me (at 1/3<sup>rd</sup> time) the leadership of the Holden three and who conducts the Harvard-Radcliffe Chorus, now numbering more than 200 singers. Choir-in-Progress (Skills for Singing), prepares singers for HRC and the Holden Choirs, and the Harvard Chamber Ensembles offers one-on-a-part singing for students in RCS, HGC, or HRCM.

Along with the Associate Conductor, each Holden Chorus thrives under the direction of their

professionally trained Assistant Conductors, who offer invaluable continuity for the ensembles and conduct many rehearsals and concerts each year. Beth Willer is in her second year as Assistant Conductor of RCS. She is a phenomenal musician possessing one of the best ears I have seen. She is warm and incredibly funny, and demanding and respectful. Her personal style and musicianship offers just the right touch for RCS. Stacey Hanson is Manager - amazing grasp of detail, sensational in organization, and most importantly Stacey always goes the extra mile and in so doing is consistently reliable. She is a blessing, and so is Emily Pierce, a warm, smiling, levelheaded, easy-going leader, and President of the Radcliffe Choral Society. Emily will represent RCS on the DCA Search Committee.

In this wonderful framework, RCS is thriving and singing incredibly well. I hope you will join RCS for our Christmas Concert with HGC, our Junior Parents Weekend Concert, and our final concert at which each of the Holden Choirs will sing the best of their 2009-2010 a cappella repertoire, and Robert Kyr's Song of Awakening, April 30, 8PM, Sanders Theatre. We and I would love to see you there.
